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From the Bridge ...

Why join Fifty-Point Yacht Club? More specifically, why do you join FPYC? What value do you see in membership? These are questions I want to start a conversation about as we go into the 2015 season. The answers

questions, and I know there are many, will help us understand how we can go about attracting more Fifty-Point boaters to the club.

So what is the value of membership? Is it worth as much as, say, a case of wine? Odd comparison? Maybe, but let's face it, if you are careful, you can put together a decent case of "boat wine" for the same price as an FPYC membership. I specify "boat wine" to differentiate it from other classes of wine. For instance, "having the Governor General over for dinner wine", or any other occasion where you might want to splash out a bit. Now that we understand the criteria, how does it compare?

So far FPYC membership is looking pretty good! So let's look at what you actually get:

Reciprocal Slips

This is the reason Ann and I first joined FPYC. Back in 1993, as novice cruising sailors, with a "new to us" 29 foot Columbia, reciprocals were the number one thing. There are currently 77 clubs around the great lakes that offer reciprocal slips to FPYC. A community of clubs, passionate about boating, making an agreement to welcome all members of other clubs. WagJag move over! This is one of the best deals anywhere.

Club Cruises

Typically FPYC organizes 6 reciprocal cruises per season. Good friends and good food, shared at some of the finest clubs on the lake. And if you are curious about what it is like to anchor overnight in a raft of boats, we have a cruise for that too. Throw in the added benefit of assistance always close to hand should you need it, and what's not to like? Any one of our cruises is worth the price of membership.

Club Racing

How much excitement can you have going 12 kph? You would be amazed! Have a power boat? Or, not ready to take your own sailboat around the marks? Sign-up to crew for another FPYC member and have a blast. This year we will also be running some distance pursuit style races. As a cruiser, I find this race format very appealing and believe that it developed directly from the original definition of sailboat racing, that is "two boats going in the same direction".

Social Events

Just in case all of the above hasn't convinced you, we also host social events. Our Pre-Splash BBQ offers burgers, hot dogs and a first chance to catch up with boating friends while getting ready for the season. Sailpast is the "official" start to the boating year. It is a celebration of boating tradition. The first sailpast was held about 200 years ago and it is based on more than 600 years of the Navy tradition of "Reviewing the Fleet". All that history and a great party! These events, along with our Summer BBQ and wrapping up the year with the Commodore's Ball, all add to, and complement activities sponsored by Fifty Point Marina. Combined they are part of why Fifty Point is a great place to call Home Port.

If you are reading this, then you are probably already an FPYC member, so I am very much "preaching to the converted". But as I said at the beginning of this article, my objective is to start conversations. Not only about the value the membership sees in the club, also about how non-members see us and what we can do to encourage them to join. FPYC Membership or a Case of Wine? But that really is not the question. To borrow another phrase, why give-in to the "tyranny of the OR"? Be a member AND get a case of wine. Double up on your benefits.

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Race Report - April 2015

World Sailing Events: Around the World race!

The Volvo Ocean (around the world) race has left New Zealand, and they are currently heading towards the infamous Cape Horn. The race was delayed as a result of the path of cyclone 'Pam', which earlier flattened Vanuatu.

Prior to departure, the fleet sailed in an in-port race, "around-the-cans". The women's team (SCA) showed some flair and lead the fleet for most of the race, and won the race, despite a late challenge from team Brunel. Although the win in the in-port race (their second win by the way) will not change the overall standings, it will likely improve their confidence in the remaining legs, so hopefully they can make a better showing in the latter stages of the race. The boats in the Double handed Barcelona World race are currently in the Atlantic on their way home to the finish after about 80 days at sea. The boats are stretched out over about 4000 nm, the leading boat being less than 1000nm from the finish. The leading boats are approaching Gibraltar, and will be battling light headwinds on the way home to Barcelona only a few days away for the leading boat. (Cheminées Poujoulat; B Stamm – J Le Cam). FPYC MEMBERSHIP E-Transfer


We Are Now Accepting E-Transfer for your FPYC Membership Fees

Wind, Weather and Waves


El Niño

El Niño is the warm phase of the El Niño Southern Oscillation (commonly called ENSO) and is associated with a band of warm ocean water that develops in the central and east-central equatorial Pacific (between approximately the International Date Line and 120°W), including off the Pacific coast of South America. El Niño Southern Oscillation refers to the cycle of warm and cold temperatures, as measured by sea surface temperature, SST, of the tropical central and eastern Pacific Ocean. El Niño is accompanied by high air pressure in the western Pacific and low air pressure in the eastern Pacific. The cool phase of ENSO is called "La Niña" with SST in the eastern Pacific below average and air pressures high in the eastern and low in western Pacific. The ENSO cycle, both El Niño and La Niña, causes global changes of both temperatures and rainfall.

El Niño is defined by prolonged warming in the Pacific Ocean sea surface temperatures when compared with the average value. The U.S NOAA definition is a 3 month average warming of at least 0.5 °C (0.9 °F) in a specific area of the east-central tropical Pacific Ocean, other organizations define the term slightly differently. Typically, this anomaly happens at irregular intervals of two to seven years, and lasts nine months to two years. The average period length is five years. When this warming occurs for seven to nine months, it is classified as El Niño "conditions"; when its duration is longer, it is classified as an El Niño "episode".

Winters, during the El Niño effect, are warmer and drier than average in the Northwest, northern Midwest, and northern Mideast United States, so those regions experience reduced snowfalls. Meanwhile, significantly wetter winters are present in northwest Mexico and the southwest United States, including central and southern California, while both cooler and wetter than average winters in northeast Mexico and the southeast United States (including the Tidewater region of Virginia) occur during the El Niño phase of the oscillation.

Some believed the ice storm in January 1998, which devastated parts of New England, southern Ontario and southern Quebec, was caused or accentuated by El Niño's warming effects. El Niño warmed Vancouver for the 2010 Winter Olympics, such that the area experienced a warmer than average winter during the games.

Lobster in Brandy Cream Sauce



1/3 cup butter
2 scallions diced
1 tablespoon minced garlic
1 cup sliced mushrooms
1/4 tea salt
1/4 tea ground pepper
1/4 cup brandy
1/4 cup white wine
2 cups heavy cream
1/2 cup parmesan cheese
Lobster meat cooked (4 lobster tails)
Noodles (fettuccini/ linguini)



Saute scallions, mushrooms, and garlic in butter
Add salt and pepper
Add brandy and simmer 5 minutes
Add white wine and simmer until reduced to half
Add cream and simmer 15 minutes until thick
Add lobster meat and heat through
Stir in shredded spinach (for colour) and stir in parmesan cheese
Serve over pasta

Can substitute shrimp instead of lobster My daughter served this for me in Calgary – delicious!
