

Fishermen's generous donation lights the way for rescue volunteers

ST. CATHARINES, Ontario (March 27, 2018) — The south shore's marine rescue volunteers will be able to see through fog and safely navigate in all weather thanks to a generous donation from the St. Catharines Game & Fish Association.

The respected local outdoors and conservation group presented a cheque for \$10,000 to the members of GAMRU South Shore Search And Rescue at the association's meeting last night. The funds have been earmarked for a new integrated radar/GPS/sonar/chart plotter system for the volunteer's 34' rescue boat.

"This couldn't be more timely for us," explains Bob Gordon, the rescue group's unit leader. "We badly needed to upgrade our navigation equipment and we committed to the project this year. This donation not only covers the cost of that investment, it is perfectly timed to help us for the coming boating season."

GAMRU South Shore Search And Rescue was called out to 28 rescue missions in 2017, the second busiest season in the unit's history.

"We value the work these volunteers do," says association president Darryl Day. "Our members enjoy Lake Ontario and all it offers, but they are very aware of safety on the water and how easily a good day of fishing can turn bad. We understand and respect what these volunteers do for us and for everyone who uses the lake."

In addition to staging a number of popular fishing tournaments and events, the association annually raises and releases thousands of young game fish into the lake, and hosts an annual event that introduces fishing to area youngsters. Association members also run the busy boat ramp on Lighthouse Road, popular with anglers and recreational boaters from around the Niagara Region.

Founded in 1988, GAMRU is the only dedicated marine search and rescue organization on the south shore of Lake Ontario from Hamilton to Port Weller. More than 30 active volunteers maintain fully-equipped rescue vessels and train year-round to maintain the skills and readiness to be effective on the water. GAMRU is a member of the Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary and a registered charity.

Lake Ontario Races and Regattas

Solo Sailing:

As Spring is now approaching it is time to think about sailing and racing.

There are a number of popular short-handed racing events again this year. There is a series event organized by LOSHR (Lake Ontario Shorthanded Racing) group and LOOR (Lake Ontario Offshore Racing). The races start in Port Credit and run around this end of the Lake, depending which race you enter in the series. Port Credit also do the Ontario 300 and 600 nautical mile solo and double handed races. The LOSHR and LOOR website https://www.loor.ca/ is open now to registration. Our neighbour club New Port YC are running a **Pursuit Race on July 1**st, which includes solo, double handed and fully crewed. There are a number of techniques and equipment available to make short handed sailing easier and safer, probably the most common item is an Auto helm to steer the boat while you do something else. To make life a little easier on board, I recently took delivery of an A2 asymmetrical spinnaker to provide me with better downwind performance without having to use a spinnaker pole. The sail tacks to the foredeck 12 inches (305mm) in front of the forestay attachment. It allows me to fly spinnakers while sailing single-handed. The sheets run back to blocks on the toe rail near the stern so that I can use the primary winches.

The solo events are generally open to boats with and without spinnakers, so if you do not have a spinnaker, you can still race.

It would be nice to see a few boats from Fifty Point come out and do some short handed sailing events. If anyone would be interested I would be pleased to meet up with you and discuss equipment, preparation or anything else.

Pursuit Race:

I have been asked a number of times to explain pursuit racing. In normal racing each fleet has a common single start time, so that you can have from 6 to 20 or more boats vying for a position to start across the line all at the same time. For the novice or casual family racer this is a bit intimidating. At the finish each time is collected, then adjusted by the handicap and a corrected time calculated. The winner therefore is not known until everyone is back in the clubhouse!

The Pursuit race on the other hand, uses the handicap for each boat, and using the course distance, the start time is adjusted for every boat so that every boat has its own start time. The differences can be many minutes, so there is no congestion at the start. The slower boats start first and the faster boats start last. On a long race, a fast boat could start 20 minutes behind the first starting boat.

The idea is to have the boats finish at the same time. This never happens of course due to different sailing skills, sails, tactical decisions etc. But it means that the first boat to cross the line is 1st the second is 2nd etc. and there is no need to wait for results back at the clubhouse. Everyone knows where they place as they cross the finish line.

Dalhousie Yacht Club Learn to Sail 2018 Spring Sailing Courses All courses open to members and nonmembers.

Our first course, **CANSail Basic Cruising Theory**, will start March 3rd and will take 12 hours to complete. This can also include your PCOC (Pleasure Craft Operators Card) if needed. Please let us know if the PCOC is required as there is an extra charge and extra information involved. The practical portion of the course will be scheduled once boats are launched. Your own boat or the club Kirby's can be used (a minimum amount of students on board will be required).

March 3rd - 12:00 to 6:00 March 10 - 12:00 to 3:00

March 11 - 12:00 to 3:00 - Exam day!

Cost - \$275.00 (practical will be 18 hours and cost \$400)

The second course will be **CANSail Basic Coastal Navigation Standard**. This introductory course offers basic knowledge of navigation theory and is the initial course in a comprehensive set of courses offered by Sail Canada on vessel navigation.

Course number three will be the ROC(M)

ROC stands for Restricted Radiotelephone Operator's Certificate and is required by anyone using a marine VHF radio or other marine radios (each person on the boat who will use the radio needs their own card). There are significant fines if you are found using a VHF or marine radio without your card. In addition, if you received your ROC card before the new Digital Selective Calling was introduced, then you are encouraged to return and get your DSC endorsement for your ROC card. All new VHF radios are now being sold with a DSC function that will greatly enhance rescue personnel's ability to assist you in an emergency. Understanding this technology and how to operate it can, in some circumstances, mean the difference between life and death.
