
Over the past four years, we have truly been blessed by the addition of many new members who have taken an active participation in FPYC including some younger members who bring an entirely new perspective.

At the AGM I decided to run again as the race director for the club in order to keep options available for members that wish to race. I believe that racing is a vital part of any yacht club. Racing provides an avenue to gain experience in all weather conditions, owners and crew learn how to handle the boat in many conditions and thus remove the anxiety about weather conditions while cruising. We hope to race in two different formats this year to cater for all people:

The first is a cruiser style 'pursuit' race. We will try and run these at least one Saturday a month and have a BBQ afterwards. The pursuit race is organized so that every boat has its own start time, in this way there will only be one type of boat crossing the start line at any one time, thus making it less congested at the start, without other boats being near.


The other format will be regular format racing on Tuesday evening with Newport YC.

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*Christine's Galley* Loaded Caulíflower & Chicken Casserole



Ingredients

3 boneless, skinless chicken breasts cooked and cubed

2 head cauliflower

- 8 ounces cheddar cheese, shredded
- 8 ounces Monterey Jack cheese, shredded
- 1 bundle green onions, sliced
- 3 ounces bacon pieces (cooked)
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- Salt & Pepper

Instructions Preheat Oven 350 Steam cauliflower until tender Combine cheeses in large bowl (remove 1/4 of cheese set aside for topping) Stir chicken, onions, bacon, garlic into cheese Stir cauliflower into cheese mixture and season with salt & pepper Pour into 9 X 13 glass baking dish Top with additional cheese Cover with foil and bake 25 minutes Remove foil and bake an additional 5 minutes, until cheese nice and brown

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# Wind, Weather and Waves

### Colorado Low

Ever wonder what a "Colorado Low" is? Read on ...

The Colorado Low is an area of lower pressure that develops in the vicinity of Colorado on the eastern side of the Rocky Mountains. The Colorado Low is the third most frequent synoptic system that influences the United States, trailing only the Alberta and North Pacific Lows. This storm system generally wreaks havoc on forecasters as it can bring an array of weather features and forecast challenges throughout the Southern Plains and the Upper Midwest before moving into the New England States. From heavy snow and torrential rains, to super-cell outbreaks and strong winds, this storm system has it all.

Generally, the Colorado Low is a re-development of a previous system that entered the west coast. Whether North Pacific or South Pacific Lows, these systems will typically dissipate as they move into and over the Rocky Mountains where rugged terrain in the mountains increases the friction leading to dissipation. The Bermuda High will allow for southerly flow to pump an influx of Gulf moisture into the southern plain states. Do not be fooled by the name of this system; this low doesn't necessarily have to develop in the state of Colorado. Many cases have shown that this system can form in the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles and possibly western Kansas. A precursor of the development of this low will be a trough that develops on the lee side of the Rocky Mountains.

The most typical track of the Colorado low is from western Kansas off to the Northeast towards the Great Lakes and southeastern Canada.


Pub Nights 2015
