





### Wind, Weather and Waves

#### **Regional Wind Effects**

#### Atmospheric stability and wind

A layer of warm air lying above cooler air at the surface creates a stable situation because the lighter, warmer air glides smoothly over the layer below it. The cooler surface layer is shielded from stronger winds aloft and remains relatively undisturbed. By contrast, if the surface layer is warmer than the air above it, the warmer air has a tendency to rise and be replaced by cooler downdrafts. This vertical exchange of air (mixing) brings the stronger winds aloft down to the surface where we experience gusty winds. In general, winds are stronger over water because friction slows down the flow over the land.

The most common example of a stable situation in summer is seen in daytime versus night time winds over land. During the day, the land heats up, rendering the air unstable, and gusty winds prevail. At night, the land cools, a stable layer forms and the winds are steady and lighter.

An example of this process occurs over the Great Lakes on warm spring and summer days – the formation of a lake-cooled layer at the surface that is very stable and free of wind gustiness. This marine inversion is like a protective blanket on the water in which cool, calm conditions persist even though it maybe windy farther up or over nearby land.

Inversions can extend from a few metres to hundreds of metres. They form regularly during the boating season over the colder waters and during calm nights. They can cover large areas but are sometimes confined to protected, small patches surrounded by very different conditions. Inversions also often have persistent fog or mist with them.

The exact opposite occurs on cool days in late summer and fall, when cool air from the North West moves over the relatively warm waters and becomes unstable and prone to gusty conditions.

#### **Pub Night**





# Toronto Port Authority Power Vessel Operators Permit Within the Port and Harbour of Toronto By Paul Charles

Every two years I get an e-mail from the Toronto Port Authority asking me if I would like to renew the Toronto Operators' Permits that Katharine and I received some twenty years ago. Dutifully I respond and send them \$60 (two licenses, two years at \$15 per year).

We first wrote the Toronto test those many years ago when we still had our boat at Burlington Sailing & Boating Club in LaSalle Park and I organized a visit by the testing crew from Toronto and we made it a club activity whereby some 35 people signed up. It was easy and enjoyable along with being quite educational. The ulterior motive was to get another piece of paper that showed us to be boating experts in the hope that this new license would ease our way into the federal operator's card which was looming in the distance. It worked in that the Toronto permit was grandfathered into the newer card and that was that.

So why renew every two years and send Ford Nation sixty bucks that could have been a good lunch at one of the fine yacht clubs we drop in to visit? Have we ever been stopped and asked for the permit? No. Do I expect to be stopped? Not really. I renew because we may be innocent victims in an incident, i.e., a crash on the water, a mistake about where the airport limitations are, or a dispute of any sort. If we have to deal with the Harbour Police I suspect they will ask for the permit and I think we will get much more help if we are on the side of the law and not flaunting it. So I look at it as just a little bit of insurance. A waste of money? Maybe, but it also may give me a little peace of mind as we dodge the tour boats, the ferries and the racers in the busiest and favourite harbour we visit.




