





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




## The 30th Anniversary Burgee Winner is .....



- $\nearrow$  Power or sail;
- $\checkmark$  Whether you plan to leave with the fleet (yes or no);
- ✗ Interest in a fun race (yes or no);
- ス Cruise Captain volunteer (yes or no).

We will reply confirming receipt of your sign-up and will let you know if you are on the standby list. Don't despair if you are, I don't believe we have actually had to turn anyone down yet. We will post a copy of the cruise schedule, the sign-up email address and information required in the display case.

### **Cruise Captains**

For each of the cruises we need a skipper to volunteer as Cruise Captain. The role involves providing general coordination for the cruise events.

For the three cruises on which dinner will be provided, the Cruise Captain will take care of purchasing food and coordinate dinner area set-up, cooking and time to get together. As noted in the last edition of Scuttlebutt, the club will cover the main dish, but side dishes will still be potluck.

Christine's Galley

HONEY MUSTARD PORK CHOPS - GORDON RAMSAY'S Serves 6-8



#### **INGREDIENTS**

6–8 pork chops, about 200g each Olive oil, to brush

#### Marinade

- 2 tbsp Dijon mustard
- 4 tbsp wholegrain mustard
- 6 tbsp runny honey
- 4 tbsp Worcestershire sauce
- 4 tbsp light soy sauce



#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

Mix the marinade ingredients together in shallow bowl. Add the pork chops and turn to coat well. Cover with cling film and marinate in the fridge for a few hours or overnight. Heat a griddle pan or barbecue until hot. Scrape the excess marinade off the pork chops and save it. Brush the chops with a little olive oil. Cook on the barbecue 4 – 5 minutes on each side or until cooked through. Baste with the marinade occasionally. Rest the chops in a warm spot for 5–10 minutes. Serve the pork chops accompanied by a side salad and crusty bread.







# Wind, Weather and Waves

Valley Winds (Katabatic and Anabatic Winds)


Valleys are ideally shaped to channel and funnel winds, especially when their walls widen gently into a harbour or basin. Strong gusty winds can funnel out of the valley and surprise boaters near the mouths of such harbours. However, there are two related valley wind phenomena that are more subtle but no less powerful: katabatic and anabatic winds.

The boater who takes shelter in a secluded cove in the evening may be surprised to awaken to sudden, strong, gusty winds in the morning. (Like I had in the 1,000 islands one year, which by early morning had completely turned us around on our anchor.) This effect is caused by a type of valley wind. At night, the air cools over

higher terrain and sinks to the valley floor. This process sets up cool night winds that are called katabatic or drainage winds. They are often quite gusty and are usually stronger than their daytime sisters, anabatic winds.

During the day, the sun heats the sloping sides of valleys, making them warmer than the less exposed valley floors. As a result, the winds blow up these slopes (and up the valleys) during the day. These winds are called anabatic winds. The strongest anabatic winds are found when valley sides slope gently and face the south, thus getting maximum daytime heating.

Anabatic and katabatic winds can join forces with land or lake breezes to make them stronger. They can also produce stronger gusty winds by accentuating winds funneling in river valleys ranging in scale.

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

#### The Marine Museum of the Great Lakes at Kingston To Present a Major Exhibit and Outdoor Exhibition Entitled <u>New Age of Sail: The Story of Canada's Sailing Boom</u>

#### New Age of Sail Exhibit

From May 5<sup>th</sup> to November 30<sup>th</sup> of this year, The Marine Museum of the Great Lakes at Kingston will present a look back at the explosive growth in the popularity of recreational sailing from the late 1950's, through the 70's. Entitled <u>New Age of Sail: The Story of Canada's Sailing Boom</u>, the exhibit will recall the exciting developments in design, construction and marketing that popularized the sport of sailing.

During these innovative years, the transition from wood construction to fiberglass gave designers the ability to conceive lighter, stronger and more durable boats. They were boats that builders could mass produce for an affordable price. And since they required less maintenance than their wooden predecessors, their owners could spend more time sailing them, and less time working to keep them shipshape. New yacht clubs and class associations sprang up as a post WW2 affluent middle class began looking for new ways to spend leisure time.

The <u>New Age of Sail Exhibit</u> will engage, inform and inspire. Visitors will encounter the past and present of recreational sailing. They will experience interactive displays, view pictorial remembrances of the era and the most famous boats. There will be half models, full models and actual boats on display, including Laser number 1, which has been generously loaned to the <u>New Age of Sail exhibit</u> by the Mystic Seaport - The Museum of America and the Sea.

The <u>New Age of Sail Exhibit</u>, co-curated by yacht designer and historian **Rob Mazza**, will honor the designers and builders of the time, giving visitors the opportunity to come to know the people and the personalities that launched sailing's popularity. The Museum is especially pleased to have as honorary curators of the exhibit, **George Cuthbertson**, a founding partner of Canada's most renowned yacht design firm, Cuthbertson and Cassian (C&C Yachts); and **Bruce Kirby**, the designer of the Laser one-design, America's Cup 12-meter yacht *Canada I*, and dozens of other successful classes and custom designed boats.

#### New Age of Sail Outdoor Exhibition

On the weekend of July 26 - 27, the grounds and waterfront surrounding the Marine Museum of the Great Lakes at Kingston will be the bustling with the <u>New Age of Sail Outdoor Exhibition</u>. The Exhibition will be open to the public and admission will be free

Experienced sailors and neophytes of all ages and interests will be captivated, enlightened and encouraged to experience the many different aspects of the sport.

There will be exhibitors and demonstrations offering information on a range of topics, including wood and fiberglass repair and restoration, a historic look from the old to the latest in equipment and technology, sails and sail making, lines and rigging, navigation, the purchase and care of a sailboat and learn-to-sail opportunities. Younger sailors, and those not so young, will be entertained with special activities including sailing demos around Kingston harbor, on land sailing simulators and radio controlled model boat races.

On display will be class boats that successfully converted from wood to fiberglass construction and still remain popular to this day, more than forty years later. We will also be showcasing the boats whose designs only became possible thanks to the technological advances of that time, including today's modern skiffs and hydrofoils.

#### About the Marine Museum of the Great Lakes at Kingston

Founded in 1975 and located on Kingston, Ontario's waterfront, the Museum is housed in the old Kingston Shipyard buildings beside the limestone dry dock built in 1891, designated a National Historic Site, and includes the original Engine House and pumps that emptied the dry dock. The Museum Ship *Alexander Henry*, a 210' ice breaker, is berthed within the dry dock. On display in the galleries is a wide ranging collection of marine artifacts and exhibits, significant fine art collection, home to 50,000 ship and boat plans, 3,500 linear feet of archival records, 31,000 photo images, over 12,000 books and periodicals, and includes the C&C Yachts, TBF Benson and the Francis MacLachlan Collections.
