From the Bridge ...

Welcome to May, new month, same effluence! Here we are with just the latest in the series of rainfall warnings. As of two o'clock this afternoon 47 mm have accumulated in Vineland with a forecast for another possible 20mm or so by the time it passes. At this point the rain has run out of places to go and has decided to make like a millennial and move into my basement. On the bright side, it gives me something to keep me busy while it is too wet to be rigging the boat. A recent report from the International Lake Ontario-St. Lawrence River Board contained the following paragraph, "The water level of Lake Ontario is now at (or above) the International Joint Commission's upper trigger level that applies at this time of year. Therefore, the Board is now operating under what the IJC defines as criterion H14, which directs the Board to set releases to provide all possible relief to riparians living along the shorelines of the entire Lake Ontario – St. Lawrence River system, balancing water levels upstream and downstream to minimize flood and erosion impacts to the extent possible." Two things from this excerpt catch my attention. The first - I now know that as boaters we likely qualify as some subclass, or at least close relation to "reparians". Now how many of you actually knew that? Second - criterion H14 can be neatly summarized as a "share the pain" strategy. Unfortunately, Rick developed cancer over the past two years and fought valiantly until the end. We had the pleasure to know Rick. Brian enjoyed the final voyage with Rick on Kerplunk to Wilson. But there are many others that helped Rick and Jan over the past year. They helped to ease the stress that one goes through as you try to get things ready for your passing and the strain on the ones left behind.

Rick passed away April 27, 2017. He leaves behind the love of his life Jan, Ricardo his son, Rose and Helen (mother and sister), Cassie and Geoff.


In short, I am looking for someone to take over Scuttlebutt soon and I am very willing to help with the transition, but time is running out as October 2017 will be my last issue.



Water Levels

Please note; this recently received email from Tony Haslam, Commodore, Cathedral Bluffs Yacht Club, is an example of the issues currently faced by many north shore clubs. It is advisable to call ahead to check the conditions at any club you may plan to visit, especially early in this season.

"Currently the high lake water level has resulted in a situation where the majority of Cathedral Bluffs Yacht Club docks are covered with water. Because of potential hazards caused by this condition, the club board of directors has concluded that CBYC cannot accommodate visiting boats at this time. The club will continue to monitor the conditions and will advise of any change to this decision.
